ENGLISH DEPARTMENT INTRODUCES NEW ELECTIVES.

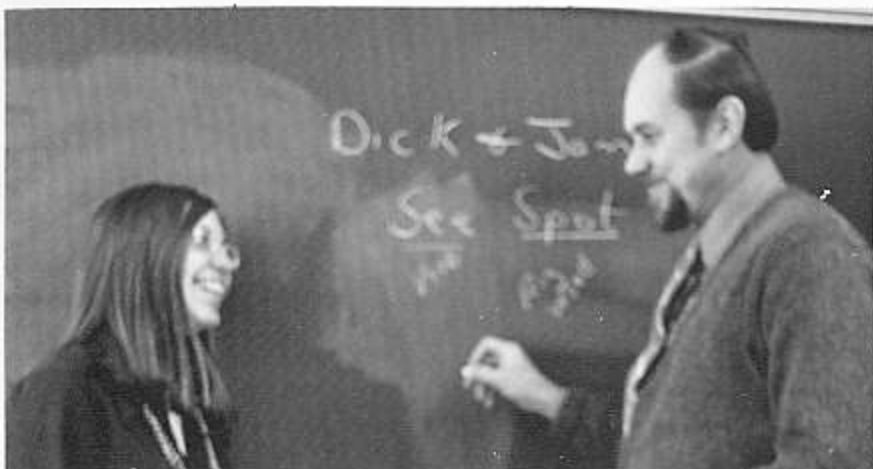

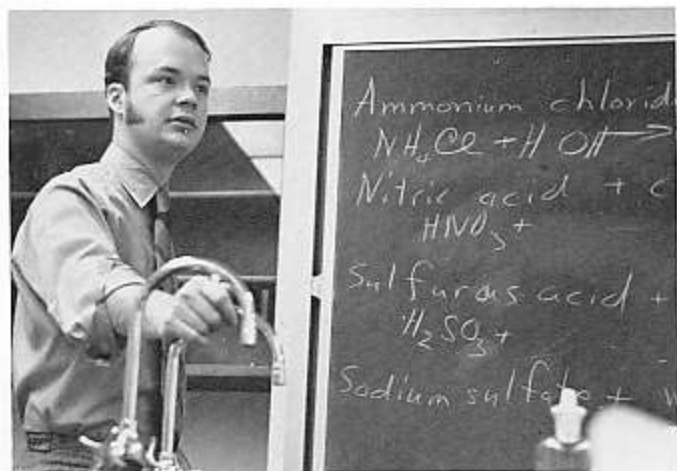
SCIENCE '71 ENTERS THE AGE OF DISCOVERY

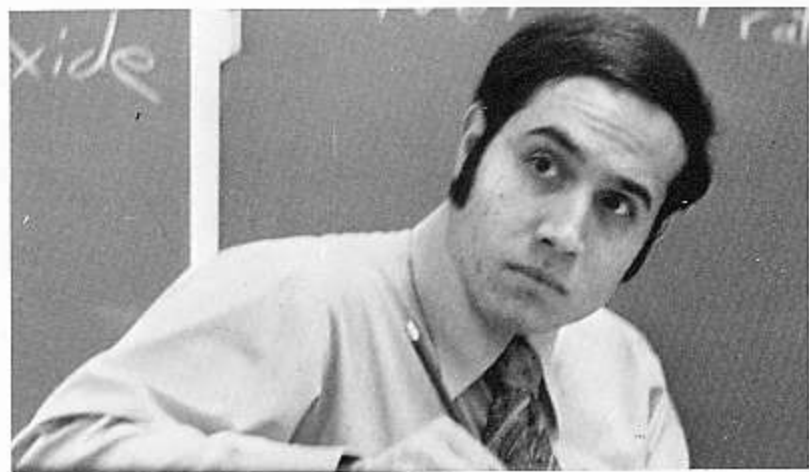

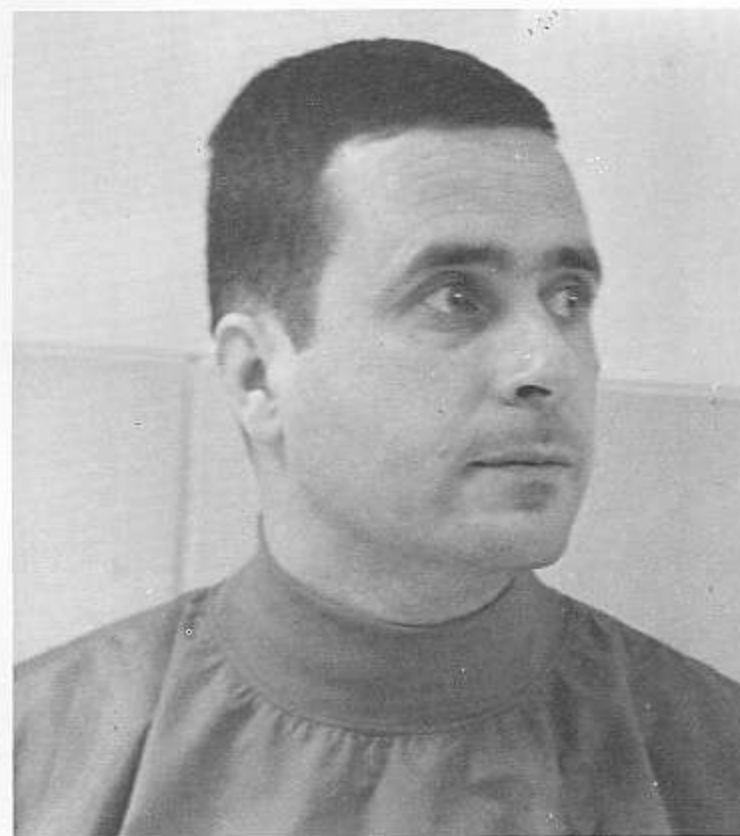

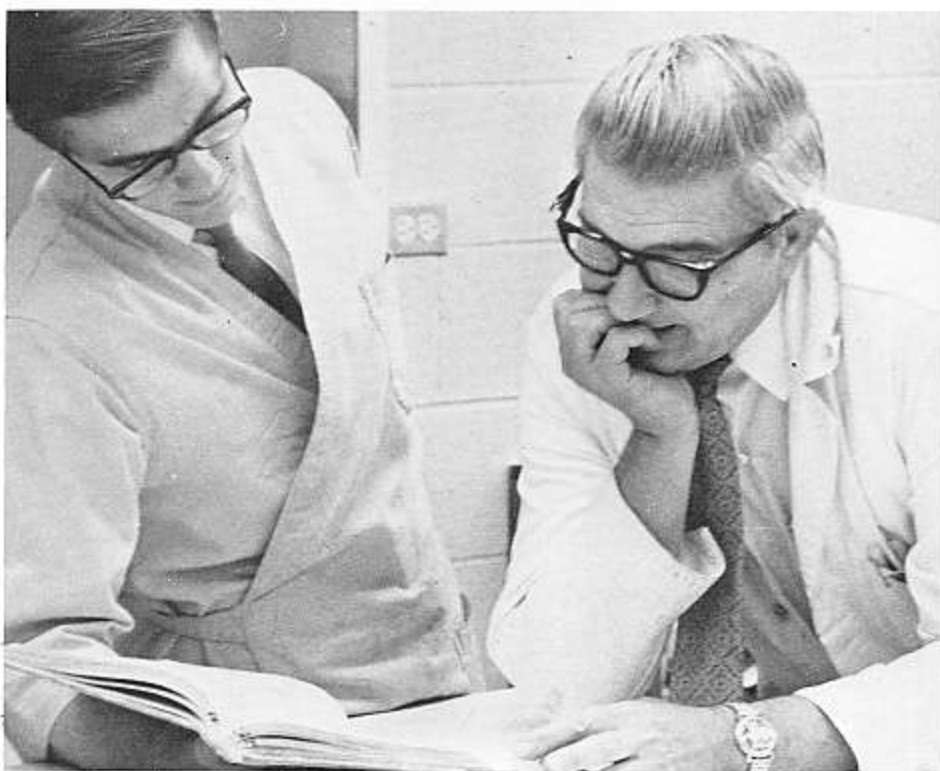
PLASTICS OPENS A NEW DOOR IN TECHNOLOGY.

SPECIAL SERVICES PROVIDE WELCOME "EXTRAS"



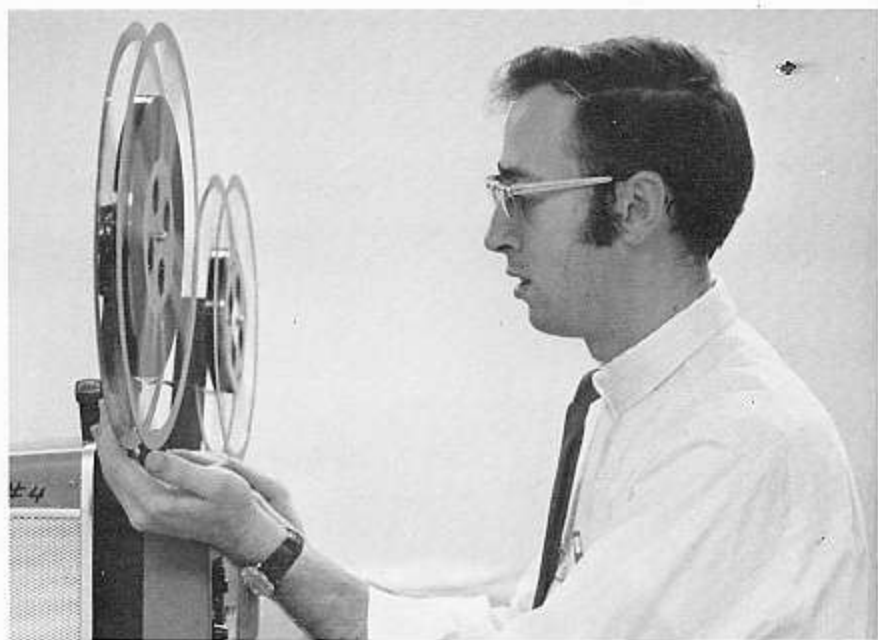

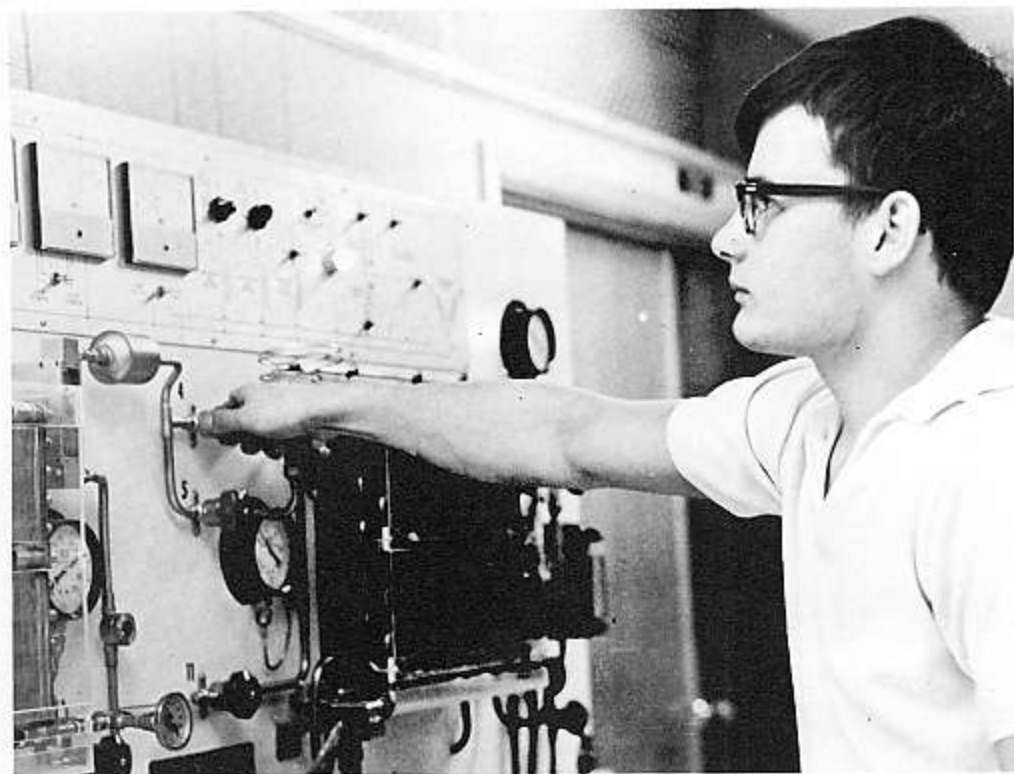

EDEN HONORS ITS RECOGNIZED STUDENTS



"The best trumpet-player in Eastern United States" was the well-earned title Tim Downey received this year. He was chosen for the All-County Band (1st position); Area All State Band (1st position); Conference All-State Band (1st position); and All-Eastern Band (1st position). The Eastman School of Music has accepted Tim on a scholarship because of his skill with the horn.

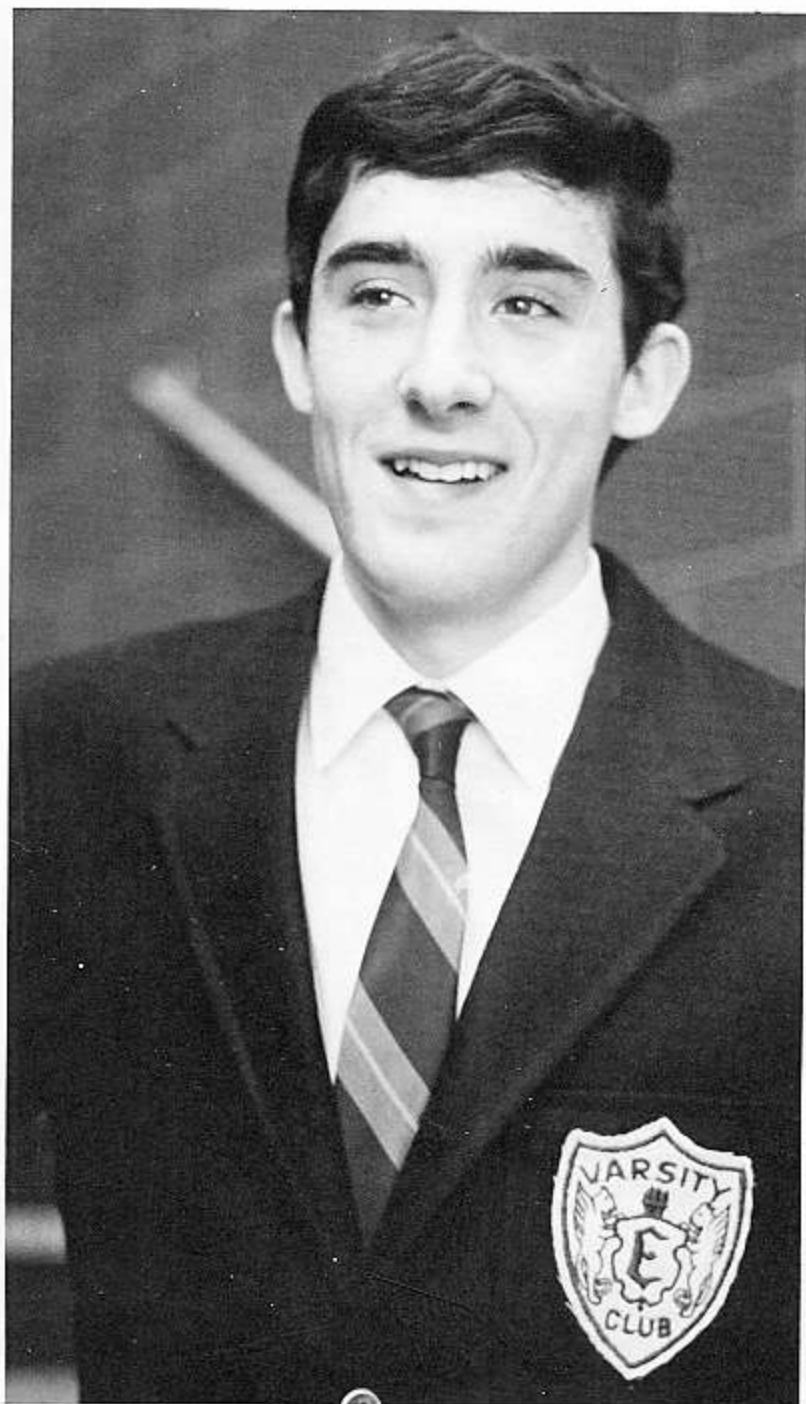

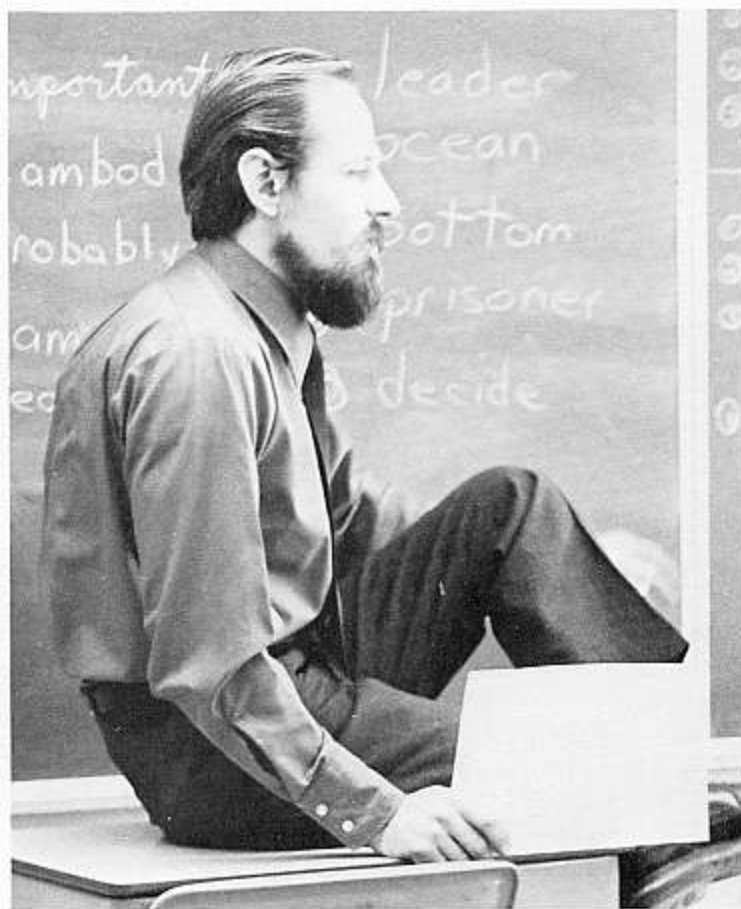
BOCES EXPERIMENTS IN LEARNING METHODS

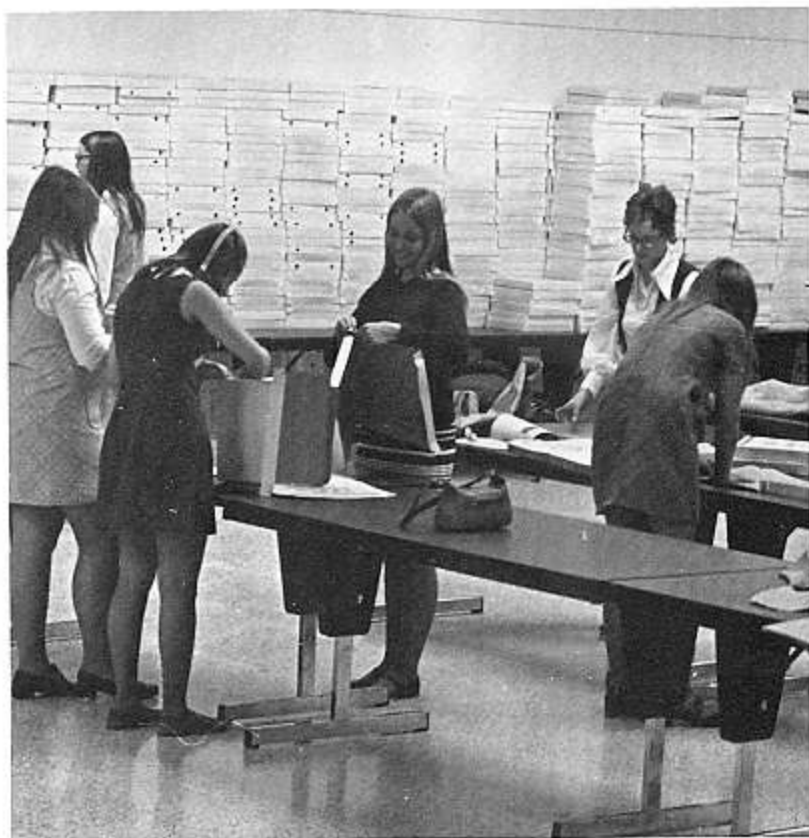

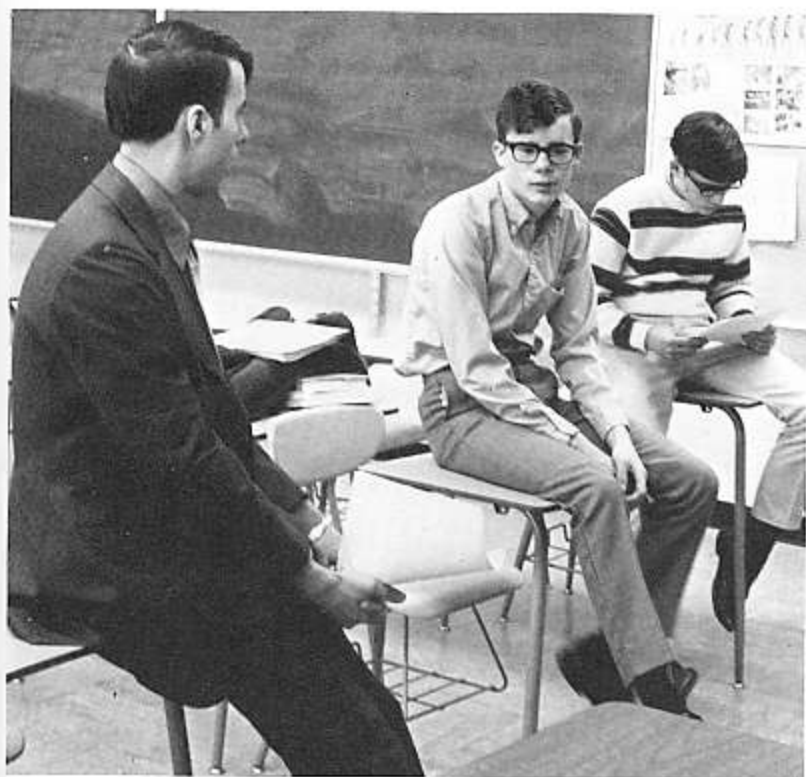

CROSS COUNTRY GOES UNDEFEATED



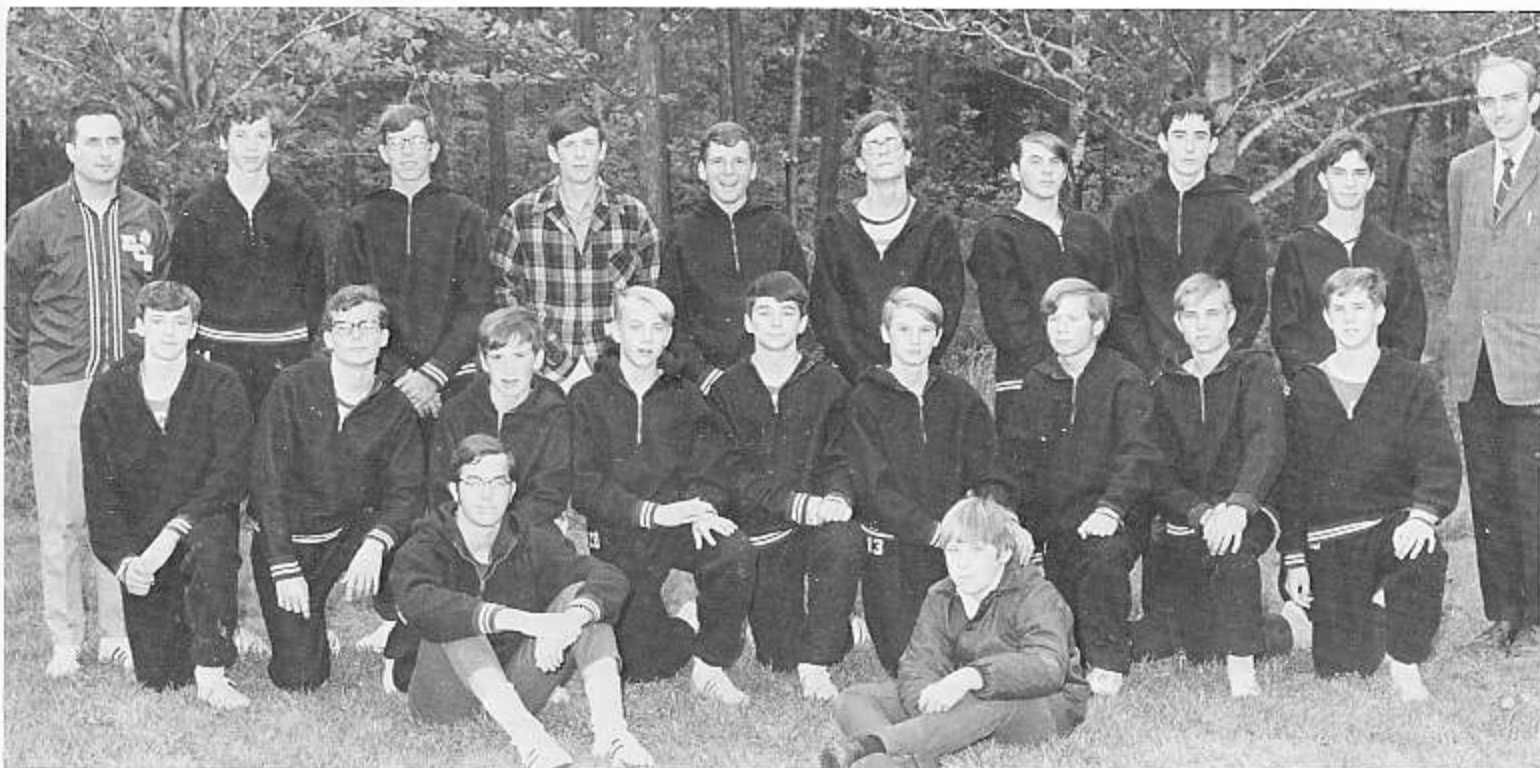

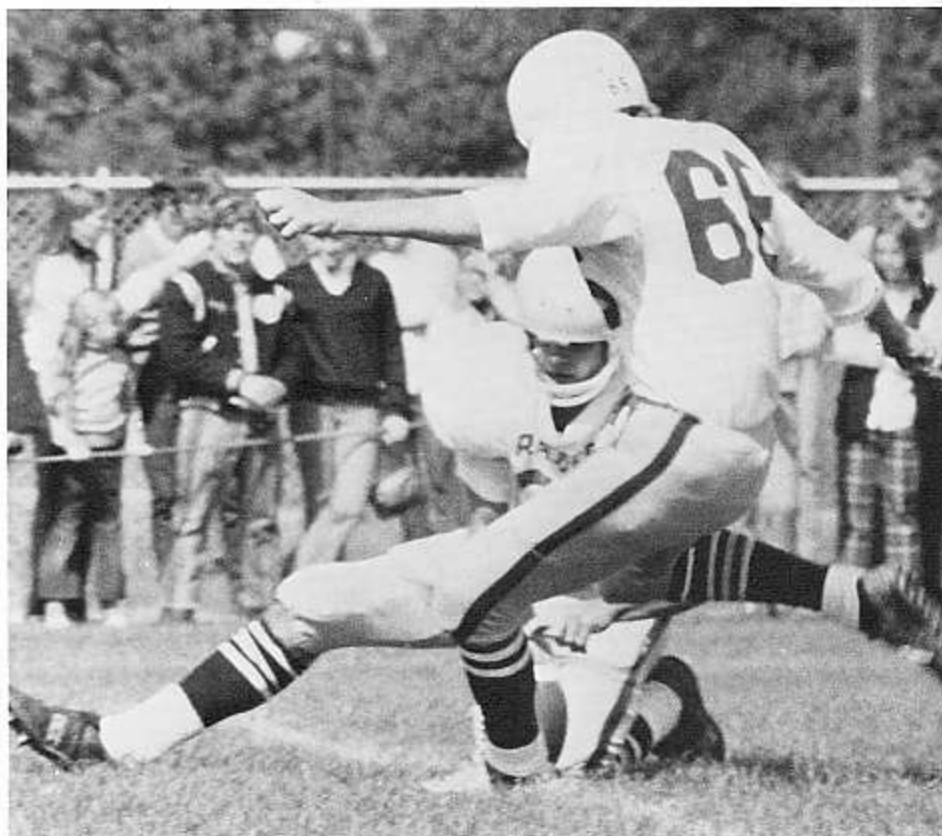
The Raiders had a tough act to follow after last season. But this year's team put forward a great effort to earn the respect of their opponents.

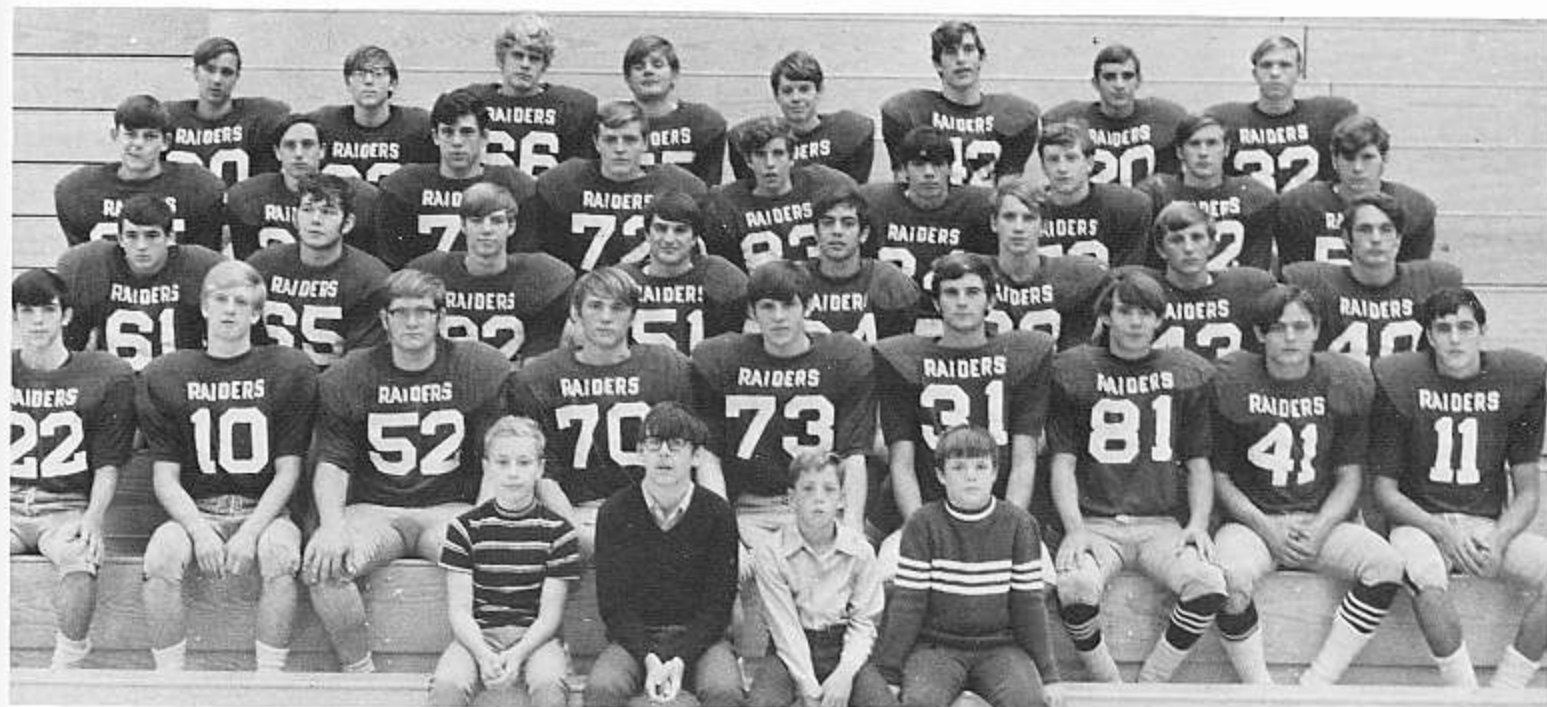

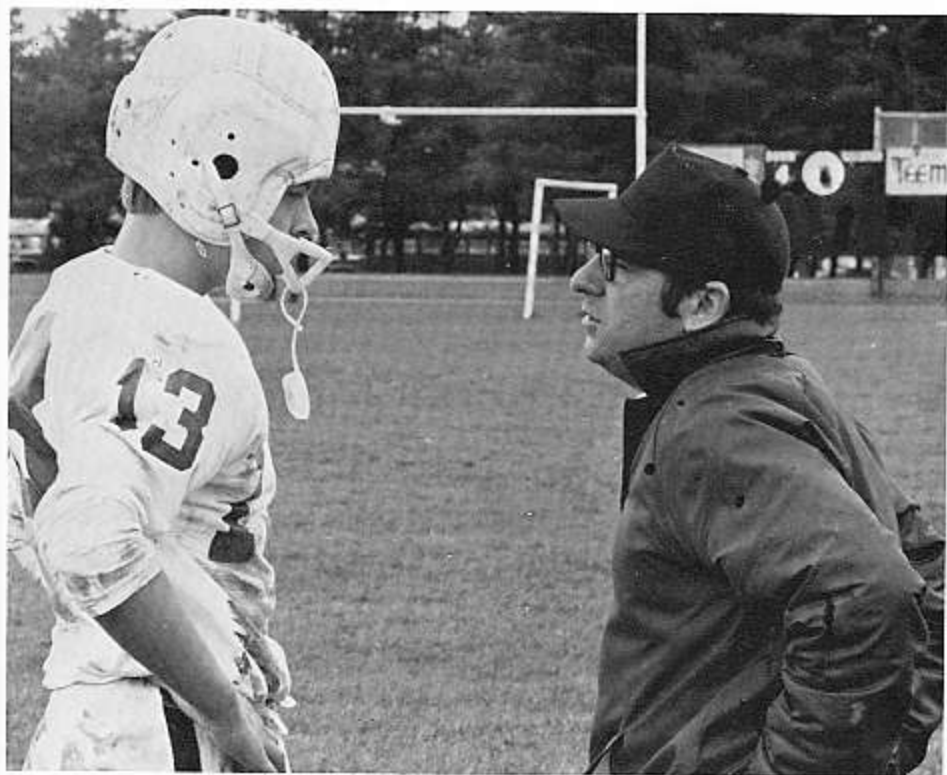

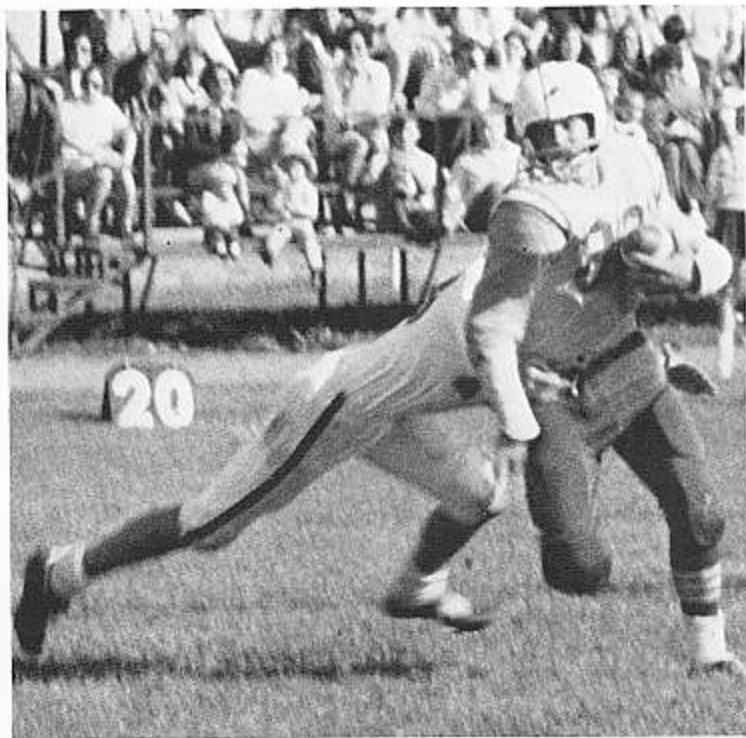

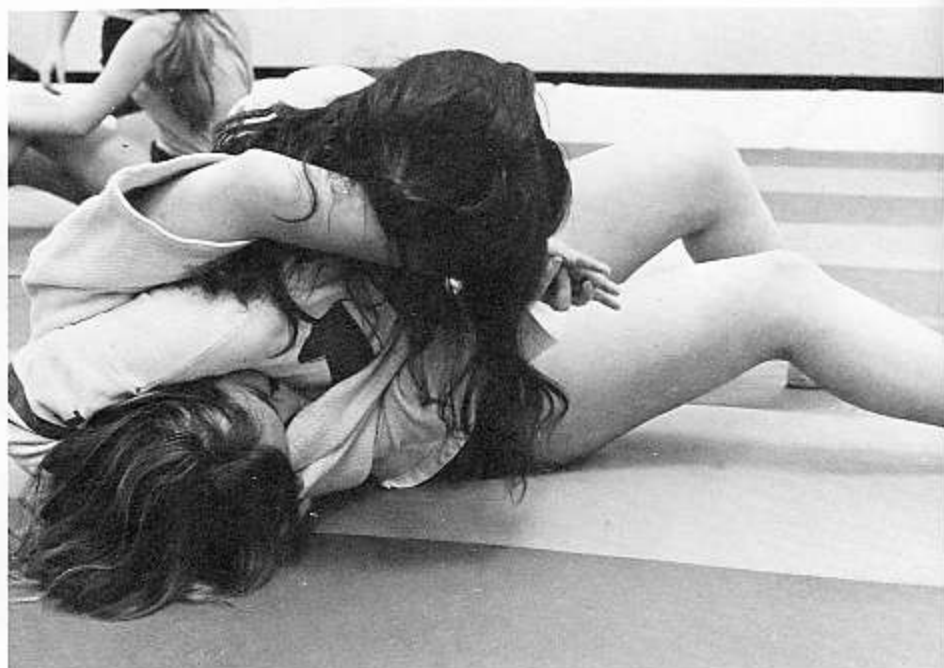

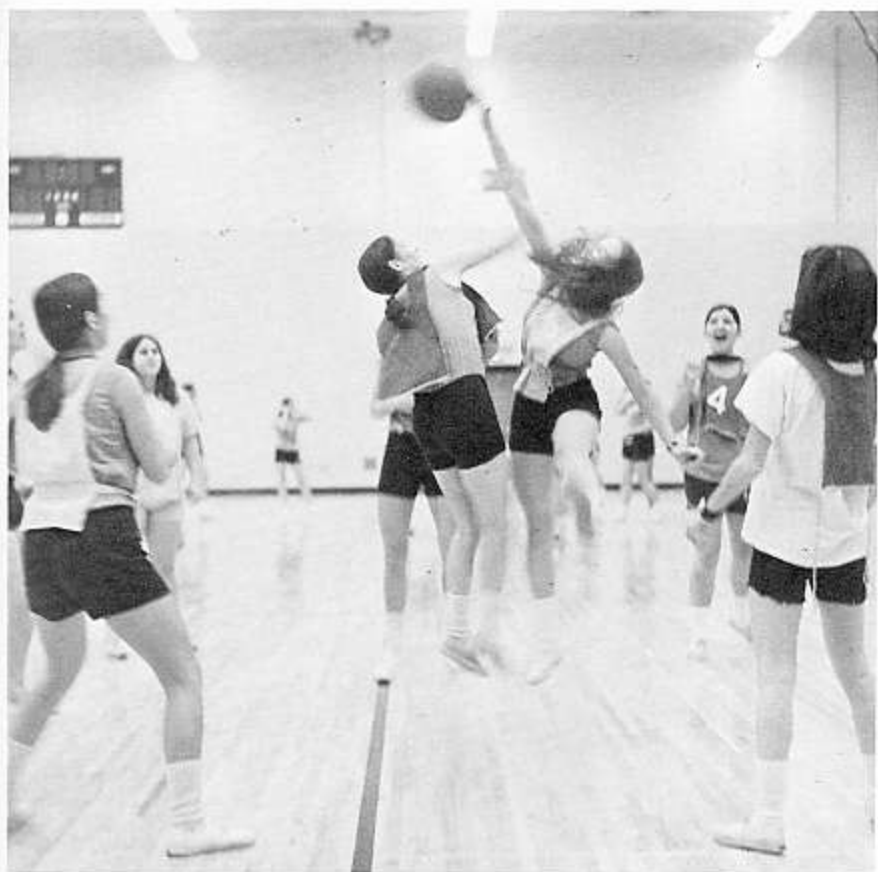

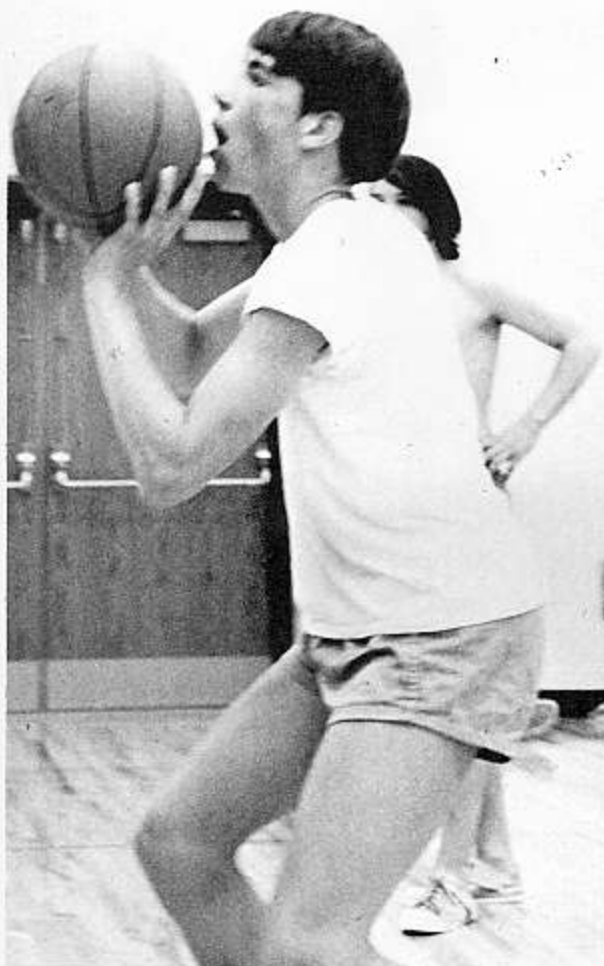

ECS CLASS OF 1971 PRESENTS A HIT —

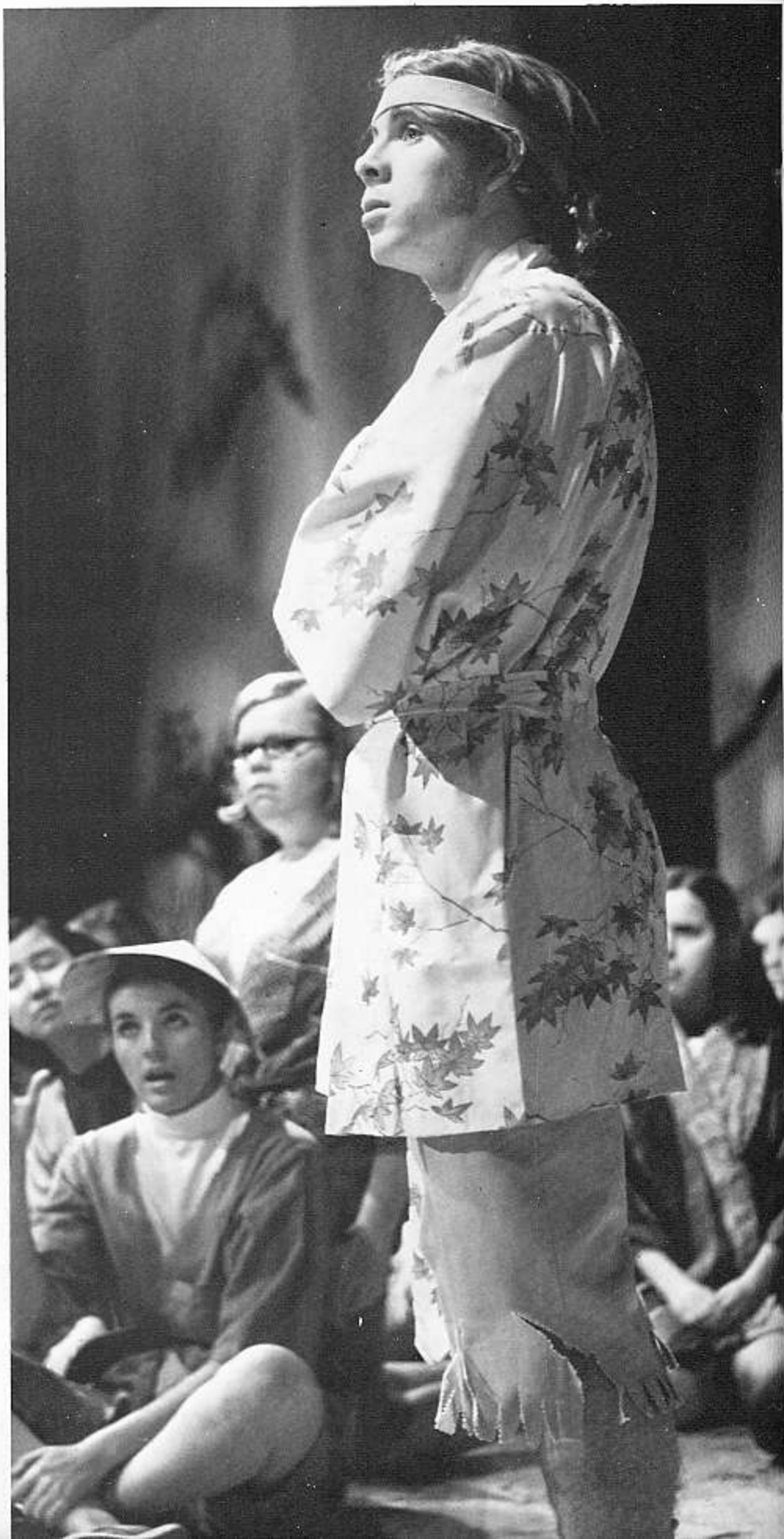

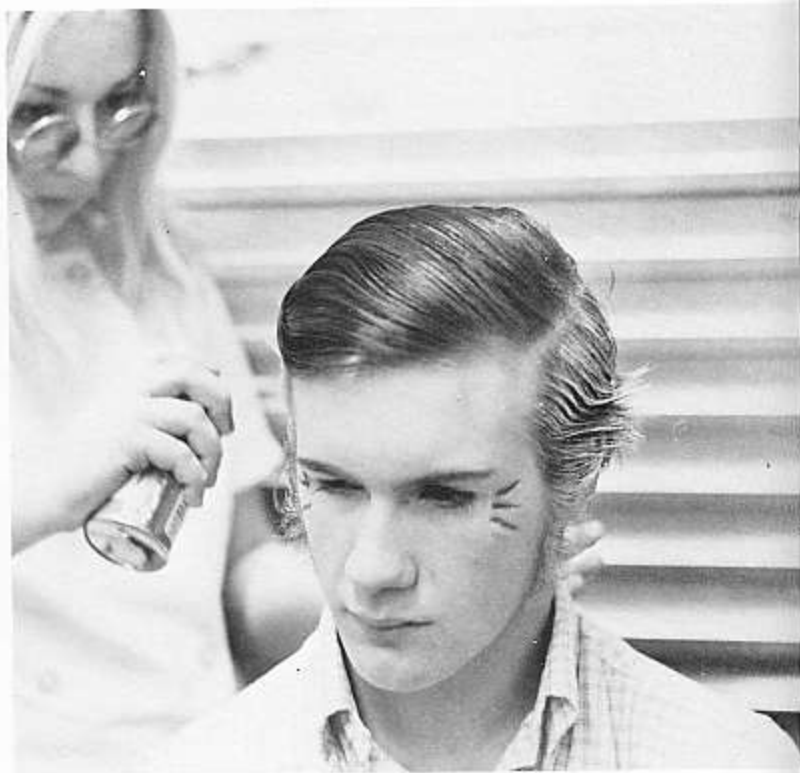

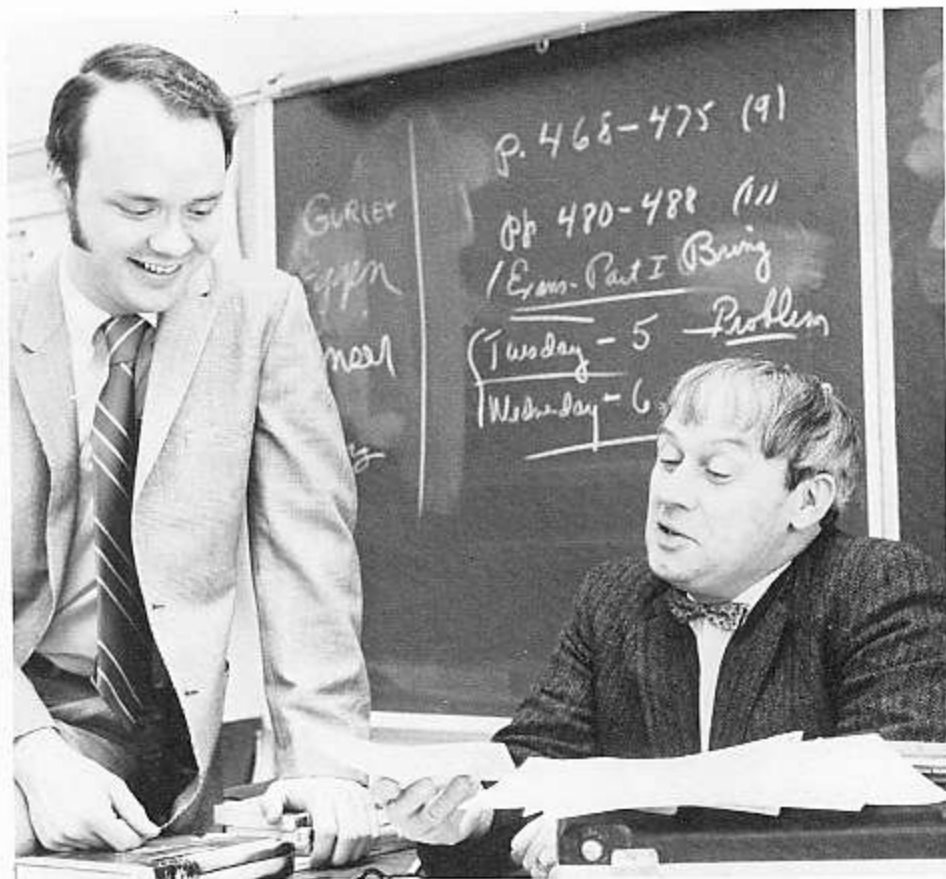

SENIOR CLASS FINISHES ECS WITH

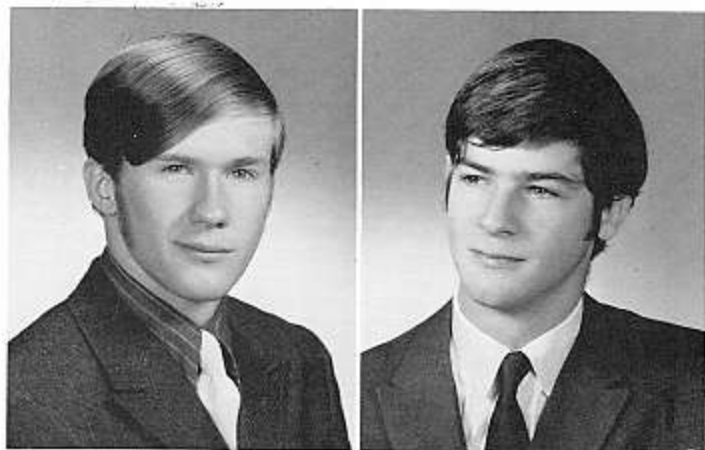

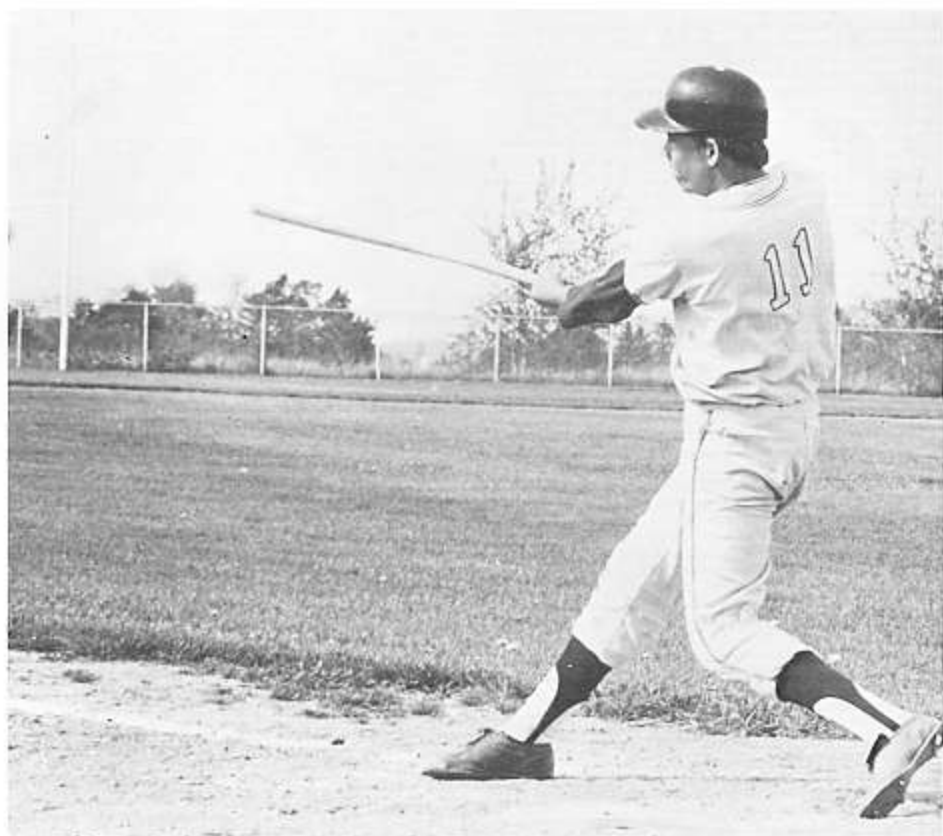

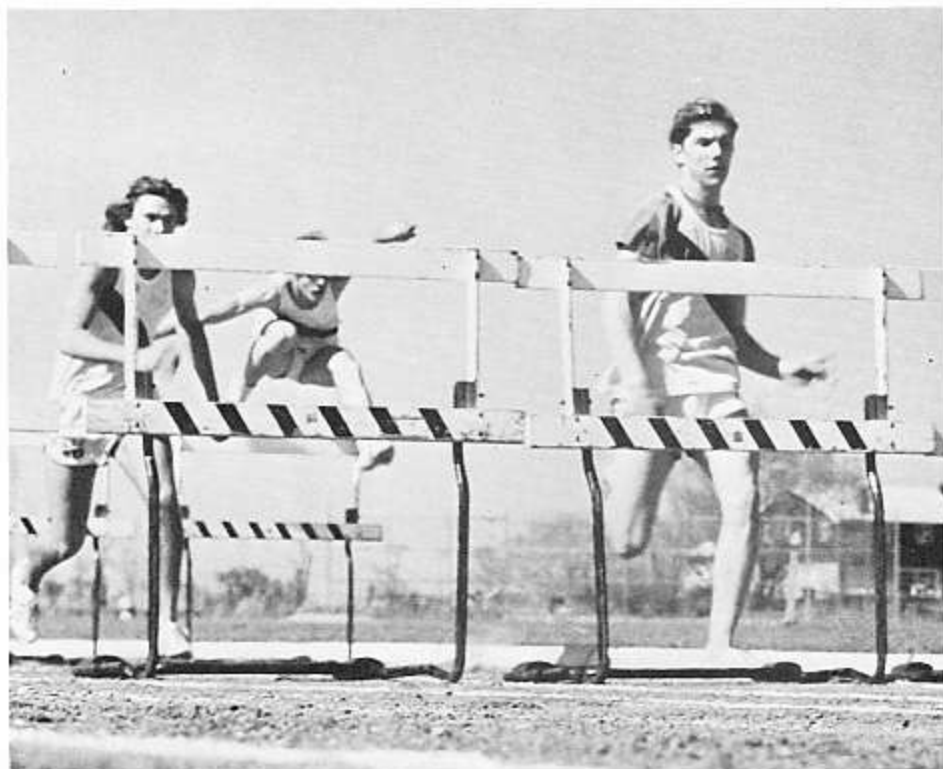
COACH STURM AND HIS BOYS UNDEFEATED AGAIN

Well, Coach Sturm did it again (with the help of Coach Roof). He had his second undefeated championship team of the year.

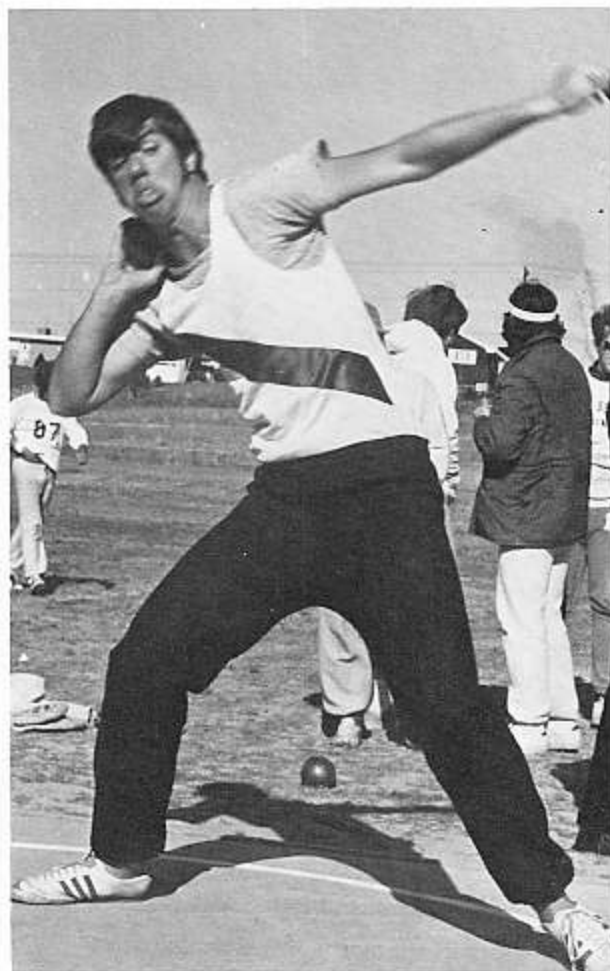

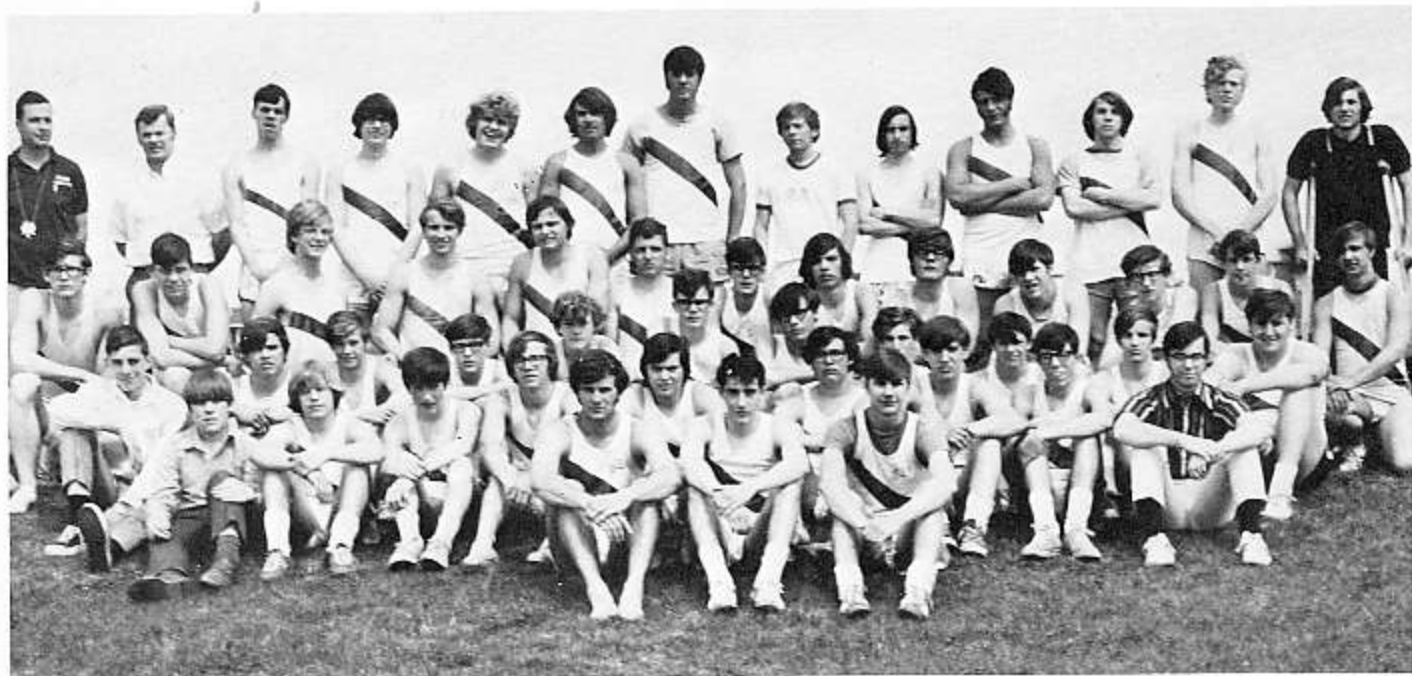

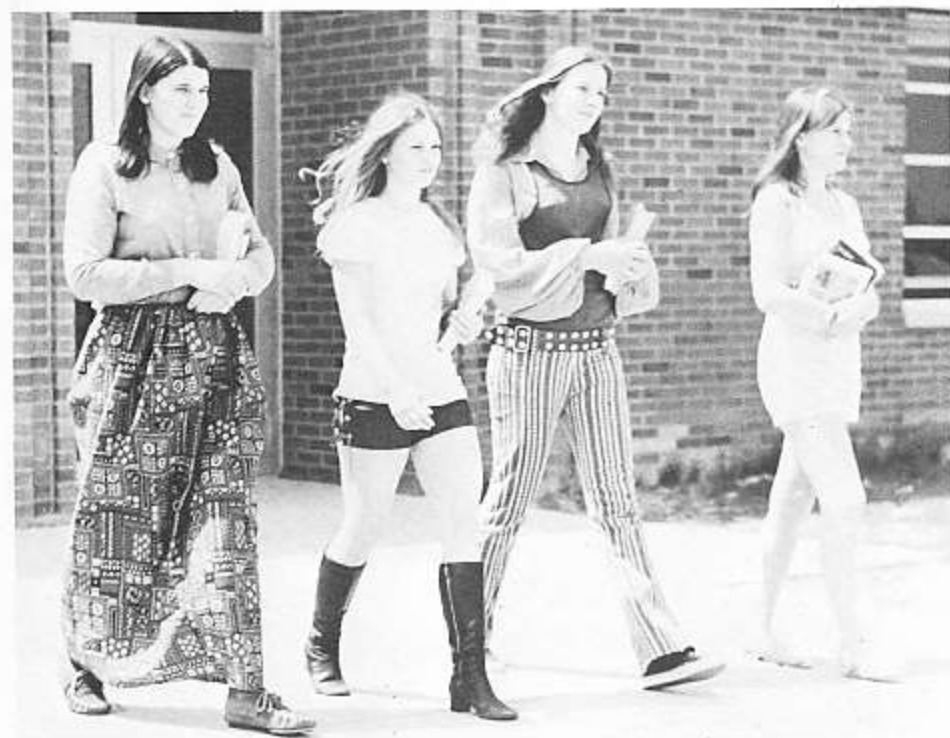
